

Report on the XVI International Bat Research Conference and 43rd North American Symposium on Bat Research

Both the XVI International Bat Research Conference and the 43rd North American Symposium on Bat Research were held at the Wyndham Herradura Hotel in San José, Costa Rica from August 11th to 16th 2013. Costa Rica University and Asociación Theria para la Educación e Investigación an NGO directed by Bernal Rodríguez-Herrera served as the local host. **A total of 639 participants attended the meetings from 55 countries in the world and presented 435 papers as a whole, 114 posters and 4 plenary talks.**

This conference was the largest in the history of IBRC (639 participants), with more than 215 students. The majority of XVI IBRC and 43rd NASBR attendants were affiliated to academic/scientific institutions, mainly from United States (30%), Germany (7%), Costa Rica (7%) and Mexico (5%). Every continent was represented, and people from nations far away as Egypt, Israel, China, Japan, Kenya and Nigeria were there. Almost all Latin-Americans countries were present, achieving one of the most important objectives for this meeting: to give Latin-American students (especially Costa Ricans) and researchers the opportunity to talk, ask and discuss with researchers from all over the world.

Workshops

We had three workshops, two before and one after the Conference. They obtained their own budget and sponsorships. The official language of the workshops was Spanish, because they were focus on Latin-Americans students.

Student Award Competitions

Graduate and undergraduate students were invited to enter their platform or poster papers in the competitions, where a special committee judged the scientific merits of their research. Jorge Ortega was in charge of organized the judged and gets the sponsors and prizes. NASBR awarded eleven prizes to participants from all over the world, as well as the Villa Award, which recognizes outstanding research by a student in a Mexican Institution.

In total 77 oral student platform and 27 poster student papers participating in the competition. The student award winner were given during the closing event:

Awards

Another three new prizes were awarded in these meetings: 1) Spallanzani Award to assist distinguished researchers from outside of North America (Mexico, Canada and the United States) to attend the NASBR, 2) Zotz Award presented by the Local Committee and the Red Latinoamericana para la Conservación de los Murciélagos (RELCOM) to honor an individual or a group of people that have participated on integral actions for Bat Conservation in Latinoamerica, and 3) The Gerrit S. Miller Award is presented occasionally by NASBR to persons in recognition of outstanding service and contribution to the field of chiropteran biology.

The award winners were:

Social events and tours

During the Conference we had three social events:

- 3. Manuel Obregón's piano concert with the play Rainforest Symbiosis.

A tourism company (Costa Rica Rainforest Experience) was in charge of organized pre and post tours to 3 different sites in the country: Guanacaste, Limón and Monteverde. The tours and the sites visited were focus on bat mist netting, with all the government permits and with a qualified guide. In some tours participants could observe more than 20 bat species and also other mammal and birds species.
